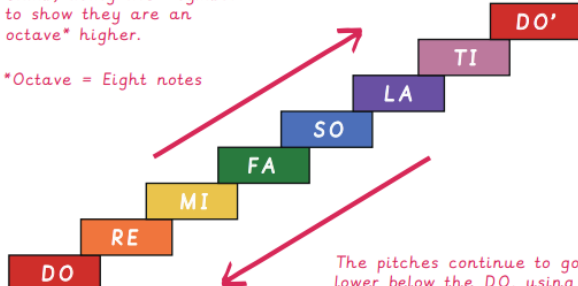

 expression	When the singing or music makes you feel a certain way	 counter melody	A melody that can be sung to complement the existing melody and uses a different rhythm	Diaphragm A dome shaped muscle, which we use to control our breath when singing.	
 dynamics	The volume of the notes	 pitch	How high or low the notes sounds	Solfa ladder pitches The pitches continue to climb, using the ' symbol to show they are an octave* higher. *Octave = Eight notes The pitches continue to go lower below the DO, using the , symbol to show they are an octave lower.	
 melody	The combination of pitch and rhythm which forms a tune	 score	A written form of musical composition		
 melody line	The notes that make a melody	Graphic score A way of writing down music on the page without using traditional stave notation, instead using symbols and images to represent the music.
